Pastor's Perspective

Was it synchronicity, just plain coincidence, or was it (as we Presbyterians might say) "pre-ordained before the beginning of time"?

When Bev and I went on pilgrimage in September, we decided on a book to read and discuss as we walked. The book was *The Rebirthing of God: Christianity's Struggle for New Beginnings*, by John Philip Newell. It's a brand new book by one of our favorite authors, and we covered a lot of ground—literally and literarily—during rest stops in France.

On the train from Glasgow to Iona, we learned that Newell would be leading another retreat there while we were on the island. Our surprise at this development was tempered by a tiny bit of disappointment, but never mind! It turned out that he, a member of the Iona community, would do a book launch talk in the Abbey, where we were staying.

Some book launch! Through a shipping snafu, Bev and I had the only two copies of the book on the island that didn't already belong to the author. The line to have our copies autographed was, therefore, short enough to allow for real conversation.

The organizing motif of his book uses the weekly pilgrimage walk around the island. He uses that to unpack the ways Christianity needs to reconnect—with the earth, with compassion and non-violence, with spiritual practice, with what other faith traditions can teach us.

Newell's reputation (according to the book jacket) is as a writer, visionary spiritual leader, peacemaker, and scholar. He speaks from deep within the Church, having served as pastor at Iona Abbey and St Giles Cathedral in Edinburgh. When he isn't writing or on speaking tour, he resides at Ghost Ranch, in New Mexico.

It is from a place of being deeply embedded in the Church that Newell speaks of the collapse of Christianity. The changes in the Church, he claims, are seismic. "In twenty-five years," he said "the Church will be gone."

What good?

One of the questions on my mind as I left for sabbatical pilgrimage was, "What *good* is the Church?" That was not a cynical question. It was shorthand for wondering about the changing mission of the changing Church in a radically changing world. What *are* we up to? And is it of any useful good, for God's sake?

It is from a place of being deeply embedded in the Church that Newell speaks of the collapse of Christianity.



Prophets now, as back in Bible times, hold God's people accountable for acting in light of that hope, no matter what—...

This year's Advent preaching series focuses on the Hebrew prophecies for the coming of the Messiah. It's called, "Dream Keepers," because the prophets served as custodians of God's hopes, desires, dreams for God's people and all creation.

It was the prophets who kept alive God's dream. We often portray them as angry screamers, but they were really encouragers, helping God's people to translate hope for the future into action in the present. Prophets now, as back in Bible times, hold God's people accountable for acting in light of that hope, no matter what—even in the face of seismic disappointment, confusion and discouragement. Even when we hear news of the collapse of Christianity, we need the prophets to help us live into the "good" of God's calling for us.
