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## Pastor's Perspective

One of the toughest recruitment challenges for a small church comes down simply to the mechanics of how work gets done. Being small, we tend to think of volunteer tasks in terms of who does it, rather than what type of gifts are needed and how does it fit into our ministry.

For years, because he was the person who did it, we thought of our Food Bank ministry interpretation as "what Lloyd does," rather than our local ministry of food justice. Many of our ministry roles have been filled for so many years by the same faithful, competent volunteers, that we tend to simply honor the individual doing the work and that person's passion for ministry. And well we should! But by seeing the job as the person who does it limits both creative and flexible thinking, so necessary to being Church in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

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### **Not Another Rant!**

No, this will not be another rant about our changing cultural climate, area demographics, and various challenges of life in the None Zone. Ironically, this is prelude to thanking a particular volunteer, whose name has become synonymous with his position.

To say "Lay Ministry Coordinator" at Springwater is to mean "Gilbert Shibley."

Technically speaking, this is true, since Gilbert not only invented the position at SPC, he has been our only Lay Ministry Coordinator (LMC). That is about to change. Session has accepted Gilbert's resignation from this position, so we are in the process of recruiting another.

The LMC came about as a result of conversations between me and the Personnel committee about cutting back my hours. The role of the LMC was to make sure those things got done that do not require a seminary degree. The goal was more than "reducing the pastor's hours." It was really a match-maker's role, because ideally the LMC would not be the only person recruited to use his gifts. The idea was to help match people's gifts and passions with opportunities to serve.

### Which is a Pretty Cool Way of Thinking

It is also a lot more abstract than we'd thought, once you get down to implementation. It is more than "someone to call" when "things" come up. "Things" do not always come up in an overt way, so critical thinking about how tasks and roles go together is necessary. As is an intimate knowledge of the organization and the people who make up the organization. A historically long point of view also helps.

You can see why Gilbert's willingness to test the idea of an LMC was such a gift. His ability to articulate our organizational hopes, quantify and



firm them up, and practice making them work was exactly what we needed. All along, his strategy was to work himself out of that job. He has been invaluable to me as someone with whom to strategize about how to get things done, going on to recruit the volunteers and connect them with resources. The technical term for that is "interpreting volunteer and ministry positions within the congregation."

While retiring from this LMC position, Gilbert will continue as Steward of Buildings and Grounds. It is no accident that the church building is a comfortable temperature on Sunday mornings and committee nights, that the manse water heater was replaced over Christmas, that outdoor work days, roof repairs, building system needs, and insurance and liability policy negotiation seem to take place "effortlessly." That's all Gilbert's handiwork, which he will continue as Building Steward.

What about You?

Here's where you come in. Take a look at the LMC position description elsewhere in The Currents. Can you fill all or part of that position description? Short of cloning Gilbert Shibley, session understands the need to be flexible about how this valuable role is filled in the future.

Flexible is not only good when it comes to being church, it is necessary—because we are not all gifted in the same way. Whenever there is turn-over in volunteers, the way things get done is bound to alter. Think about my earlier example of Lloyd's interpretive role for our mission at the Estacada Food Bank. Even in that example, it took more than Lloyd to be "Lloyd," since both he and Lucy took our donations to the Food Bank, kept the records, and encouraged us in our food donations. After Lloyd died, his "role" became what Kathleen and Lynda and Barbara do.

It might take more than one person to be "Gilbert" as well. See you in church.

## "How to Be Human" on June 21

#### **Functions**:

<u>Work closely</u> with the Pastor, Deacons and Nominating Committee to find who has skills and interests which may fit well into current leadership needs. Discuss such options as appropriate.


<u>Keep informed</u> of the directions set by session and their implementation by groups or individuals through committee reports, session's Action Minutes, and conversations with various leaders. Remind people that we are depending on them as part of our ministry together.


Be <u>alert to overlap</u> of any group's ministry with that of other groups or individuals. Help them see ways to facilitate the others' actions, and connect well with their own. Good communication oils the parts of our machine reducing heat build-up and smoothing the ride.

## **THANKS from Your Buildings and Grounds Committee.**







## What Is the Session Doing?

In case you didn't know: the session is the governing board of an individual PCUSA congregation. The Session for Springwater meets roughly once a month in what are called "Stated" meetings. These are scheduled and announced. Anyone is welcome to attend.

Each meeting is held in the context of worship. We pray and read scripture together. We often have some training. This month we discussed the article "Can churches disagree and still stay together?" by <u>Jonathan Merritt</u>. Then we do the routine things of approving the minutes, reviewing and receiving both the financial report and the pastor's report.

These are the actions taken on May 7:

- \*Approved the planting plan for the area just north of the front door (funded by donations)
- \*Approved Gilbert Shibley's plan for transitioning to a new Lay Ministry Coordinator
- \*Approved the Endowment Committee's recommendation to use Endowment funds for the Mission Trip. And approved an estate planning workshop to be held in the fall.
- \*Approved added expenditure for an enhanced website that will allow audio and page protected abilities.
- \*Asked Buildings & Grounds to draft emergency response scenarios for the church (earthquake, fire, communications)

The Worship committee put together a fabulous proposal for creative ways to do worship this summer. The sermon/worship theme for the summer is Seasons of Creation. The session:

- \*Approved having three family movie nights in our outdoor worship area for the congregation and community
- \*Approved negotiating with a gospel bluegrass band to lead worship and have a concert afterwards with a picnic
- \*Approved utilizing website and blogging capabilities, to have presermon discussions as well as a Sunday of pass-the-mike interactive sermon. The first of these will be after on June 21
- \*July 19, we will commission mission trip and make use of "witness" stories from members of the congregation
- \*July 26 (when Eileen is on the mission trip) having a Hymn Sing Sunday, led by Kathleen.

The most exciting suggestion, one that has independently percolated up through Worship Committee, Deacons, and Faith Nurture, is the practice of "The Church Has Left the Building." This is an enormously appealing practice for Millennials. Please read more about this at the top of page 7, in the Worship committee report.

## Additional thoughts from Session:

In light of the changes in both state laws and the PCUSA Constitution, we have known for some time about the need to talk about Christian Marriage. At the March meeting, session asked Eileen to look up the PCUSA curriculum on the subject. Dave and Bev Crow are both willing to lead that, time and venue to be negotiated (maybe in the fall). Further discussion is planned.



## **Summer Worship**

Summer worship news includes the fact that we are not holding a "Vacation Bible School". Instead we are going to host family movie nights in the amphitheater. We are in the process of working out logistics of the speakers, projector and DVD player at this time. I'll keep you posted.

We are hoping to invite a Blue Grass Gospel band to visit us in worship sometime this summer or fall. Worship may include Pass the mike sessions and witness messages from members.

The biggest change we are hoping to make is "Church Has Left the Building". This would be a new direction in Christian fellowship and service. On one Sunday a month in place of regular service, we as a congregation would gather to do a service element. This might include: open the food bank one Sunday a month. hold a soup kitchen somewhere in Clackamas County, hold a work party for someone in need, or assemble Kord's Klub bags. I'm sure there are many areas where we may be of service. There are lots of opportunities for changes and improvements to answer God's call to act in his name. These are just a few.

## Free Vision Screening in Estacada


The Casey Eye Institute Outreach Van together with the CVIM Founders Clinic, will be coming to the Estacada Community Center on June 6, offering free vision-screenings from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. to county residents in need of eye care. The CVIM Founders Clinic assists with follow-up care and eyewear. CVIM's mission is to provide free medical care to low income, uninsured and underinsured Clackamas County residents on an appointment basis.

To pre-register for the free vision screening exam, call 503/722-4400. Tell your uninsured neighbors know about this, too.

The van is staffed by volunteers, who will need to be fed. If you are able or willing to help provide and/or serve snacks or lunch for these volunteers, call the Estacada Community Center.







## **Lectionary Readings and Summer Worship**

Again this summer, the Order for Worship will be paperless. It will be more casual in style, and the form of the service vary. Throughout June and part of July, the preaching will focus on the Season of Creation. We praise the Triune God as "Creator, Redeemer, Sustainer," but the church calendar does not have an overt focus on God as Creator, as it does on Jesus as Redeemer and Holy Spirit as Sustainer. The preaching series will consciously reflect on the foundations of redemption and sanctification, namely, the very creation itself, which scripture tells us is also redeemed and sanctified. Throughout Church history, our theology, our ethics, and our worship has been oriented toward our relationship with God and our fellow humans, overlooking God's relationship with all creation and our corresponding relationship it.

Since our worship services will be more inter-active this summer, you may wish to prepare by reading and reflecting on these texts before coming to worship on Sunday:

June 7 (EARTH): Genesis 1:1-15; Romans 1:18-23; Psalm 104:24-26

June 14 (OCEAN): Job 38:1-18; Luke 5:1-11; Psalm 33:1-9

June 21 (HUMANITY, celebration of the Lord's Supper): Genesis 1:26-28, 2:7-8, 15, 19; Psalm 8

June 28 (SKY): Jeremiah 4:23-28; Philippians 2:9-13; Psalm 29
