#### Pastor's Perspective

Lent arrives so late this year, for a while there, we thought we were going to have to skip it this year and go straight to Easter. But no, it's only a trick of juxtaposition between the lunar calendar (which establishes Passover and Easter) and the solar calendar (which establishes our civic lives). Lent, of course, begins 40 days earlier, no matter when Easter is. It's the time of preparation for an event of such mind-boggling power and startling reality, we really do need every one of those 40 days, to prepare.

This year, our Easter worship and daily devotional will use a pilgrimage metaphor—Abram and Sarai's pilgrimage. Take a look at the article associated with the list of Lectionary Readings in this issue of *Currents* for more on this subject.

#### **Pastoral Prerogative**

It is both privilege and burden to invite a congregation to accompany a pastor's spiritual journey. In some circles, this is known as "lead from the front." In other circles, it acknowledges that "The best sermons are the ones you preach to yourself."

If you were at the annual meeting this year, you will remember that part of my Terms of Call for 2014 includes a 3-month sabbatical, reflecting the policy of the Presbytery of the Cascades, in which pastors are eligible for a 3month sabbatical every seven years. Hard as it is to believe, this year is my fourteenth year at Springwater.

My first sabbatical, in 2008, was after eight years. We had applied for and received generous funding from the Lilly Endowment during the seventh year of my time here. That funding, directed to pastoral renewal, also included funding for a parallel sabbatical for the congregation. This paid for a sabbatical interim (Beverly Crow, now our parish associate) and three artists in residence. We began preparations for our parallel journeys six months ahead of the start of sabbatical, and we are still experiencing repercussions from that wonderful time.

This year, because we were not eligible for outside funding, our parallel sabbaticals will not involve outside speakers. And of course, although the congregation continues to pay my salary, Rick and I will fund my sabbatical expenses. Session has already invited the Reverends Beverly and David Crow to be our sabbatical interim co-pastors.

#### **Preparing for Sabbatical Together**

Because my sabbatical will include a pilgrimage along the Way of St Jacques in France, our preparations together begin with Lent. Most of Europe is covered with a network of pilgrimage roads, many leading to Santiago in Spain and dating back to before the Crusades. The pilgrimage model of these

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Years ago, when I was actively backpacking, my cohorts and I would prepare for packing by laying out everything we thought we would need. Then, the challenge was to reduce it by at least half. This took some serious soul-searching about whether we really needed a particular item enough to carry it the entire trip. Cutting tags from tea bags only goes so far in eliminating weight when you're carrying everything you need on your back.

That is the first challenge of pilgrimage. As writer Joyce Rupp and her walking partner made the pilgrimage to Santiago, they learned that even adding a succulent tomato for lunch was sometimes just a few ounces too many uphill over rough terrain. They also discovered the hidden message in a balanced load.

#### The First Lesson

Christian mystic Meister Eckhardt said, "God is not found in the soul by adding anything but by subtracting." Our Lenten experience might be to question everything we've put into the backpacks we call our lifestyle—all those "things I gotta do" we carry, all those anxieties and bad habits on our backs. This might be the Lent to intentionally engage in what Meister Eckhardt calls "subtracting." Perhaps we'll come to see that the balance of our lives is just as important as what we pack.

#### Timeline of Springwater's Pilgrimage

The liturgical art in the sanctuary this Lent will visually evoke pilgrimage. Encircled by a pilgrim road, worshipers will begin to notice dates and photos. The dates span Springwater Presbyterian Church's lifespan—from 1889 to 2014. It's 125 years, in case you haven't heard—our Quasquicentennial.

Between those dates are snippets of photos, mounted on scallop shell shapes. The scallop shell is one of the European pilgrimage symbols, harking back to medieval pilgrims following the Camino do Santiago and the Way of St James. That symbol is used to mark the road, and travelers wearing that shell symbol are instantly known as pilgrims on the Way.

You are invited to write on the path mounted on the sanctuary walls. It's paper, after all. Please mark in the appropriate decades, dates and events of significance in your life and that of Springwater. What year were you baptized? When did you join the church? Were you married here? When? Do you remember the names of pastors over the years and when they served? When was the addition put on? How long have we enjoyed running water?

Share your memories of Springwater's pilgrimage. We'll save this as a record of our celebration.



#### **Lectionary Readings**

As in previous Lenten preaching series, this Lent we take a single text and explore it in conversation with other texts. The focus text "Covenant Under the Stars," in Genesis 15, follows God's call to Abram and his wife Sarai in chapter 12, to "get up and go" from their hometown of Ur. At this point "where" is an unanswered question. It is simply to a land God will show them—someday.

Three chapters and twenty-some years later, after covering half the Middle East in nomadic wanderings, the couple is still childless. They and their entourage have suffered famine, war, ruptures from their extended family and learned to tithe. When Abram points out the discouraging obvious to God (lack of offspring), he is told to go outside and try to count the stars.

For over a thousand years, Christians have imitated Abram's pilgrim wanderings with their own. As Abram waited for God to keep the Divine Promises of progeny, place, posterity, and Presence, so the people of God have waited. Pilgrimage is one of the ways God's people "leave home" in order to hear more clearly God's promises to them.


