Pastor's Perspective

It was the catchy title that got me onto the book—What's the Least I Can Believe and Still Be a Christian? But it stayed on my "get around to it" bookshelf until, in search of resources for the youth Sunday School class, I finally read it. When my co-teacher, Nike, shared with the youth the section "Ten Things Christians Don't Need to Believe," the ensuing conversation lasted for months.

So I got to thinking, maybe the adults had these things on their minds, too. Thus was born an Eastertide preaching series. Since the theme of the Eastertide season is always "How to be the Church," what better way to examine "being church" than by examining the beliefs we hold in common?

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Another Wrinkle

At our annual joint deacon/session planning retreat, I was given the assignment of exploring the absence of 20-somethings in church. The bottom line, I have discovered, is that "churchiness" does not answer the needs of young people.

Really? Forming the proper kind of committee doesn't fascinate everyone? It turns out that, for people in their 20s and 30s, meaningful service is what gets them to form community, rather than denominational affiliations. For them, it's about *doing* compassionate service, and nuances in theological flavor don't matter. "Faith tradition" is a non-starter for them. If you are not a 20- or 30-something, "how to be the church" is going to be different for you.

For the Silent Generation (born 1930-1945), membership is critical to being church, and most have the sort of loyalty that means they do not leave the denomination of their birth. They express their faith in communal terms. For the Boomers (born 1946-1964), God is about relationship, but their notion of church hinges on advocacy and justice, whereas for the Gen Xers (born 1965-1980), the "tradition" portion of "faith tradition" does not even figure. Rather than the peacemaking approach of the Boomers, Gen Xers deconstruct and question. For them, God is concerned for all of creation, but not so much for the individual. They are the beginning of the "spiritual but not religious" movement, whereas the Millennials (born 1981-2000) are the real standard bearers for it. For them, God creates and orders the world, but faith is so taboo a subject that most have no faith practices at all.

Connection

Where these two topics intersect—the beliefs we hold in common and generational issues—is crucial for the future of the church. Religion changes, because what shapes each generation is different and exerts a



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different influence. What shaped the Silent Generation was the Great Depression and World War 2. What shaped the Boomers was protest and civil rights movements. Gen Xers were the first latchkey kids, shaped by an economy of boom and bust and television's popular culture. Millennials have stay-at-home dads, soccer moms, helicopter parents, and cybernetics as their influences.

God does not change, but how we approach and perceive God changes, in part because of the world in which we grow up. We need to change who answers the question, "Is the church still relevant?" Rather than allowing popular culture and talking heads to define and disseminate what we believe, we need to learn what makes us distinctive Christian. As Springwater celebrates its 125th year of ministry in this community, the question becomes even more pertinent. That's what we'll be doing in Eastertide this year.

What will the pastor's sabbatical look like?

The basics: Our regular pastor will be away for the months of August, September and October 2014 and on a religious journey on foot in Europe for about three weeks in the middle of that time. She will keep telling us about it before, during and after.

While Eileen is away we will have contracted replacement pastoral services provided by a couple of co-pastors who know us quite well, Beverly and David Crow. They will divide time and responsibilities about equally so as to best serve our congregation's needs. This will allow Beverly to walk with Eileen as a tactical and spiritual support person while on the pilgrimage.

Who is going to make it all happen?

Session has already budgeted so the pay for services can keep us with the same rate of support our regular pastor provides. They will cooperate with the Crows to keep things running in our usual ministry. A Sabbatical Support Committee has plans to coordinate responsibilities for a smooth transition to and from the three- month "journey" we are all going to share. I am on the Committee with Nona Shearer and Kathleen Souders who chairs it.

As Lay Ministry Coordinator I may be asking you to do some new things to be sure nothing too big can fall through the cracks. Session and I join in pledging that we can all find it a good leg on our spiritual journey together. *Gilbert Shibley*


Youth Group Activities

. . . we prayed for the congregation, studied one of the Holy Week texts from scripture, and did some business:

- ⇒ authorized a letter to be written to both the County Commissioners and the County Highway Department, asking that a speed limit sign be posted on Springwater Road where there is currently just a "Congestion" sign.
- ⇒ asked the Personnel Committee to work with the Reverends Beverly and David Crow to develop a job description for them as co-pastors during our pastor's sabbatical August through October this year.
- ⇒ approved the Heifer Project offering for VBS and embraced the theme for this year, "Kids, Take Courage!"
- ⇒ approved worship in the canyon the same weekend as the youth camp out in the canyon (July 27).
- ⇒ examined Marlee Odell and received her for baptism as a believer.

Changes on the Session

It was with regret and gratitude that session accepted Cindy Woodbury's resignation as Clerk of Session. Cindy is caring for her mother and is no longer able to continue as an active elder. Please hold her and her family in prayer during this difficult time.
