World Communion Sunday

Springwater Presbyterian will celebrate World Communion Sunday by sharing from other traditions. If you are so inclined, feel free to wear traditional attire from other cultures and bring bread to share from other traditions.

"All who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves." (I Cor. 11:29)

The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world. Paul tells us that we are to "discern the body" when we partake of Holy Communion, mindful that we note our relationship to all our brothers and sisters in Christ in the celebration. One is not to go hungry while another is drunk! (I Cor. 11:21). This is scandalous behavior opposed to the Way of Christ. Thus it is appropriate that World Communion Sunday is also a time when we receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering as a way of continuing the ancient Christian practice of sharing what we have with brothers and sisters in need.



Springwater Presbyterian will also be dedicating the Peace and Global Witness Offering on October 2nd. Here is how your gift is used:

A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice

across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace.

Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries

of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

Building Maintenance, new and old.

Noticed our new look? Maybe not, since the church was white before and still is. The manse had a roof before and still has, but now gray instead of silver colored. As a member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, Al Conway lined up and monitored the painting contractor to go over the entire outside of the church, including the belfry. They kept missing spots and he kept getting them back to do it right. Jim Odell as a member of the Committee tended to the manse roof replacement. He is a pro and his company did a complete tear-off and re-roofing with no monitoring necessary other than his own as boss.

As our designated contact with the manse renters I did get a call from Jim when his crew stirred up a yellowjackets' nest in the attic of the small west addition to the manse. With a neighbor's help I got up and sprayed but failed to kill them. So I lined up a pest company and with "full battle gear" and special tools they delivered the fatal punch, the war was over and soon the roof was finished.

Over the nest, the exposed original boards were historic: odd dimensions, different colors but well built. That addition had been built as a bedroom by Rev. Cook about 1935 using donated materials, most from a lumber firm in Clackamas but some evidently from church members' surplus. Ten years later I saw Rev. Hawley convert it to a classroom, and he also shingled the church. In 1930 the steeple shingles had been painted white by Bill Shearer (23) and Rev. Hollensted (63) tying wooden ladders together to reach that high. The same method was used by Bob Akins and Elwin Shibley in the early 1970s to remove the decorative finial from steeple top and cover the hole with a pointed sheet metal cap.

Volunteer crews from the congregation have tended the steeple and painted both church and manse over the years. They did a major restoration of the manse inside and out in 1983-4 with Don Guttridge and Gwen Shearer leading the charge. That may be when the newly replaced aluminum roof went on the manse. A group of members painted the church then, too. In 1997 a contractor brought the belfry and steeple down for structural and surface upgrades (including shingles) then hoisted it back up into place. Since then both buildings have also been painted inside and out by contractors.

Volunteers, contractors, professionals, pastors, members and officers have combined in various ways to keep our 1890's manse and the 1904 church in sound and presentable condition. By the Grace of God no loss of limb or life has resulted and hopefully this will be true for the next 125 years as well.
